	about 10 to 15 of those are urgent. There is currently a two to three week waiting period and they are now booked until the end of April. More meetings are being held virtually to address the increase in demand. The adolescent health unit has two beds with rapid turnover. The live-in treatment centre has capacity for three youths; a fourth has been taken on as an exception. The live-in treatment program is being moved to be part of main Owen Sound building as it provides more space. This move will happen in a couple years. A sensory room will be built as part of the organization. • Lorie Hill, FASworld Canada, advised they have formed an accessible services team in Port Elgin, that also services Owen Sound, Kincardine, and the Bruce Peninsula. • Marlene Webb, Community Living Walkerton and District, had no updates. Marlene enquired about developmental teacher training and student transitions. Melissa McEwen advised training was focused on IEP development, psychology, and behaviour, providing ABA strategies. Students are connected with outside sources when they are over 18. This is dependent on age and credit accumulation. • Jackie Ralph, Canadian Mental Health Association, Grey Bruce Branch Mental Health and Addiction Services, shared the many initiatives and events they are supporting including: • FAN Club presentations including self-esteem, pink shirt day coping with bullies, dealing with change and feelings – including follow up activities. • Intermediate presentations including different stressors and coping strategies, Kahoot quiz about youth friendly supports. • Classroom Champions is now live. Ten schools are involved. • Presenting at parent council meetings. • "Spring Break" kits are being coordinated. • "Good Deeds" project in the works. This project encourages support in the community for mental health residences. • Youth Empowerment Project – a singer and youth engineer have been selected. Collecting and adding pictures of youth who have thrived throughout the pandemic. • Living life to t
